

his edition of the Progress Report includes some of our 2019 highlights such as an additional \$15 for affordable housing annually, passage of the raise the wage legislation in the Senate, making mail-in voting accessible to residents, and receiving television coverage for our office initiatives over 40 times.

Now, 2020 is the Year of Justice. Our agenda includes, but is not limited to:

1. Environmental Justice

- a. Getting lead, asbestos, and mold out of our schools
- b. Requiring electric companies to buy 30% of their electricity from clean energy sources by 2030;

2. Economic Justice

- a. Moving neighbors into higher quality jobs and careers;
- b. Enacting a retirement savings plan to help people retire in dignity;

3. Social Justice

- a. Reducing the number of people on probation and parole
- b. Getting guns out of the hands of dangerous people

THE 2019 FIGHT FOR ECONOMIC JUSTICE

Last year, we continued fighting for everyday people by working to increase the minimum wage and proposing solutions to help reduce poverty.

My Senate colleagues and I passed legislation to increase the state's minimum wage from \$7.25 to \$9.50 per hour by 2022.

This would give workers a \$4,680 raise and save \$30 million in state assistance annually.

We still have work to do. We need to make sure the minimum wage continues to increase as the cost of living goes up, increase wages for restaurant

workers stuck at \$2.83 an hour, and allow cities to increase their own minimum wage. The start of the work is for the House to pass the minimum wage legislation that we passed in the Senate. We will continue to advocate for a fair wage of \$15 an hour.

To further reduce poverty across Pennsylvania, we conducted a Poverty Listening Tour in Lock Haven, Erie, McKeesport, Germantown, and Scranton. The report from this tour offers 20 recommendations, including providing childcare on late nights and weekends, investing in more affordable housing for those in need, providing more transportation, and increasing pay. un violence is a problem in Pennsylvania. Solutions with the most success in reducing gun violence in our communities include, but are not limited to:

- 1. Taking guns away from dangerous people. Emergency Risk Protection Orders would allow law enforcement to temporarily take firearms from those who a court determines are an extreme risk to harm themselves or others.
- 2. Funding and supporting mentoring programs. Youth who have positive mentors and activities are more likely to turn away from guns.
- 3. Put more effort into investigation and prosecution of illegal straw gun purchases Reducing illegal gun sales will keep more guns off the streets.
- 4. Support Ceasefire and focus-deterrence approaches that get those involved in crime into productive activity.

You can support these recommendations and more. Join an organization with an emphasis on gun violence prevention and elect public officials who are gun violence prevention advocates. We must own our solutions and reduce gun violence to build safer communities.
