

Gun Violence Prevention

Outnumbered in Harrisburg

We are all accountable for reducing gun violence in Pennsylvania and in Philadelphia. In Harrisburg, we sponsored legislation to cut access to guns by:

- 1. Requiring a permit to purchase a gun (SB 1253)
- 2. Expanding background checks (SB 88)
- 3. Requiring reporting of lost and stolen guns (SB 217)
- 4. Taking guns away from people who pose an extreme risk (SB 134)
- 5. Banning assault weapons (SB 1300)

The Republican majority blocks these solutions. They choose to protect guns, not lives.

At the same time, we successfully secured **\$290 million** for gun violence prevention initiatives in Harrisburg. This includes **\$185 million** for law enforcement agencies in the

2022-2023 budget and \$105 million for community prevention grants. These grants for community interventions have grown from \$7.5 million to \$105 million in five years. We must put these dollars into effective organizations

and maintain support for years to come.



Red Flag Laws Prevent Suicides

Gun suicides account for more than 900 deaths every year in Pennsylvania. In June, Congress passed a law to encourage states to take guns away from people who are at greater risk of suicide. Congressman Dwight Evans and I demanded that the General Assembly

pass an extreme risk protection order, or red flag law. This order would allow a judge to temporarily take away a person's firearms, if there is documented evidence that they may harm themselves or others. Red flag laws work to save lives. Pennsylvania must

do what 19 other states have done to save lives. Again, the Republican majority blocks this solution.

Governor Wolf and I recently met to discuss reducing homicides and suicides by gun. We continue to work together for change.





Mayor Failure

Every U.S. city that recently reduced gun violence has a strong mayor, which is missing in Philadelphia. After unsuccessful efforts to reach Mayor Kenney in 2021 privately, I posted my six demands on social media in January. On 13 March, faith leaders across the region prayed for peace. On 18 April, I led a sit-in with advocates outside of Mayor Kenney's office at City Hall. We demanded that he convene a multiagency committee of law enforcement and human services agencies to meet weekly and address gun violence.

Days later, we met with Philadelphia Police Commissioner Danielle Outlaw, along with Mayor Kenney and his team, and received disappointing results. On one hand, the mayor expressed support for cleaning high crime blocks and increasing anti-violence interrupter street teams. On the other hand, he refused to convene weekly multi-agency committee meetings. The mayor refuses to change course and do what has proven to work in other cities.

Bottom-Up in Neighborhoods

On 14 January, a 17-year-old girl was shot and killed in a car at Ross and Sharpnack Streets in East Mount Airy. I was deeply saddened by this news and knew we must do more to stop the violence. On 15 January, I joined 17 With Life, a nonprofit organization that guides youth, and neighbors for a vigil to pray for the family who lost their daughter. From that meeting, we launched a bottom-up neighborhood peace program.

FIRST, we gathered key anti-violence organizations to increase cooperation. Our gun violence menu of resources highlights violence prevention organizations in Northwest Philadelphia.

SECOND, we mapped gun violence to show prevention organizations which high crime blocks to focus on. The shootings are shown as yellow and red dots.

THIRD. we started a pilot block cleaning effort with Glitter, a weekly litter cleaning service. On 15 June, in partnership with Mt Airy CDC and Germantown United CDC, we launched the NW Philadelphia Block Cleanup and started weekly cleaning of eight crime blocks. Since blight increases crime in neighborhoods, we're excited to keep crime blocks clean. Visit *getglitterapp.com* to learn more.

Our advocacy continues. The fourth step will include sharing proven examples of what works to reduce gun violence with organizations. The fifth step will include bringing mental health and social services to high crime blocks. The sixth step involves bringing job access to high crime blocks.
