

Dear Neighbor,

n my time as your state senator, 2022 has been both the most successful year for legislative change and the most disappointing year for community change. On one hand, as this report will show, we expanded access to childcare, so that a family of three can earn up to \$69,000 and maintain childcare assistance. We doubled money for dual enrollment, so that high school students can take college classes. We doubled money for higher-education assistance programs for first-generation students. We increased funding for affordable housing by \$20 million each year. On the other hand, the Supreme Court overturned Roe v. Wade, which protected abortion rights. Mayor Kenney failed to adopt gun violence solutions that work, as gun violence soared, which caused me to sit in at his office. Once again, the General Assembly failed to raise the minimum wage, which stands at \$7.25 per hour.


What's ahead? This year, my office is focused on five core challenges that affect our communities, state, and nation:

- As the nation becomes more diverse, we are working to fill the leadership pipeline with anti-racist Black, Brown, and White leaders that embrace diversity.
- To secure women's equality, we will advocate for paid leave, which is a step towards recognizing women's worth and their significant role in families.
- To address climate change, we shall continue to push for the use of renewable energy, such as solar and wind, to decrease our reliance on oil and gas.
- To reduce income inequality, we will fight to raise the minimum wage to at least \$15 per hour.
- To attain peace in our neighborhoods, we look forward to working with Philadelphia Ceasefire in the Stronger Together effort in Northwest Philadelphia.

We can meet these challenges and create a future with determination and vigor. In the words of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., "A man can't ride your back unless it's bent."

Renewable Energy

arming temperatures around the world have caused extreme storms, rainfall, and flooding. If we don't act now and curb the use of dirty energy sources, these events may intensify. Renewable energy can replace electricity sources that create climate change. Renewable energy creates over 100,000 jobs in Pennsylvania and helps us to save the planet. In 2022, I continued to work to obtain bipartisan support for legislation to require

electric companies to buy at least 30 percent of their energy from clean energy sources and support solar power in our neighborhoods. In 2023, our new

legislative goal is to require companies to buy at least 40 percent clean energy by 2040.

Childcare Assistance for Moderate-Income

'n July, I secured \$25 million to help moderate-income families pay for childcare. This funding is a direct result of our five-stop Poverty Listening Tour and recommendations in 2019. Now, moderate-income families can continue to receive assistance and avoid the cliff from losing child benefits. For example, a family of three can now earn up to \$69,090 and still be eligible for the Child Care Works Subsidized Child Care Program. Previously, a family of three could not earn over \$51,606 to be eligible for the program. This is a breakthrough for families in Pennsylvania. Our next objective is to secure paid family leave.

Peace

In January 2023, the state followed my recommendations and awarded \$2.4 million to Philadelphia CeaseFire and \$818,000 to Mt. Airy CDC, among other organizations, to reduce gun violence in the Northwest. These organizations and others are applying proven gun violence prevention strategies in high crime areas of my district. Philadelphia Ceasefire uses the internationally recognized Cure Violence approach to cut gun violence. Mt. Airy CDC partnered with Glitter in June to conduct weekly cleaning of eight crime blocks. Since blight increases crime, we're excited to keep streets and sidewalks clean. In October, my office and the 7G's started bimonthly job fairs. Over 30 employers offered work to 70 neighbors, including formerly incarcerated individuals. Bringing jobs to high crime areas helps to build hope and reduce gun violence. We look forward to supporting the Stronger Together initiative in the Northwest, as we focus on a safe summer of 2023.

Raise the Wage

n 1 January, 23 states and Washington, D.C. implemented higher minimum wages, but not Pennsylvania. We have the lowest minimum wage in the nation. The last time the Commonwealth raised the minimum wage was in 2009. Now is the time for Harrisburg politicians to vote for dignity and respect of every worker. In June, advocates and I stressed the need to raise pay from \$7.25 per hour at a press conference at the State Capitol. In September, I helped SEIU Healthcare Pennsylvania caregivers to win strong union contracts with pay raises. All workers deserve good jobs and fair pay. My office is working with advocates from across the state to



raise the wage to \$15 per hour. We must support hardworking Pennsylvanians. To learn more, participate in upcoming meetings, and sign up to be an advocate, contact my office. For updates, follow the hashtag #FightForPayInPA.

Filling the Leadership Pipeline

n January 2023, my office kicked off a series of virtual advocacy trainings to teach neighbors how to run for elected office, including school boards. While Philadelphia appoints its school board members, the remaining 500 school districts in Pennsylvania have elected school boards. Dr. Damary Bonilla-Rodriguez, School Board Director of the East Stroudsburg Area School District, and I educated viewers on how to make positive changes in their neighborhoods by serving on school boards and as local elected officials. Partners included Committee of 70, Latino Victory Project, and the Governor's Commissions on African American Affairs, Asian Pacific American Affairs, and Latino Affairs. We had over 100

participants in the trainings and 13 people who will run for school board. We are committed to diversifying Pennsylvania school boards to gain representation of all voices in school districts and communities across the Commonwealth. Since Pennsylvania is becoming more diverse, we need leadership that reflects the diversity.
